Current Funding Opportunities

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SAM.gov Entity Registration and Renewal Reminder

All entities seeking Department of Justice (DOJ) grant funding must have an active registration in [SAM.gov](https://sam.gov). Once registered, entities must complete annual renewals to maintain an active status.

It is recommended that you **begin the SAM.gov registration or renewal process 30 days prior to any deadlines** to allow for the time necessary to complete the full process, including SAM.gov's entity validation process. If you intend to apply for a specific DOJ opportunity, refer to the Grants.gov due date provided on the solicitation, and plan your SAM.gov registration accordingly.

- To enhance capacity to identify, assist, and provide services to all victims of human trafficking, OVC leads the Nation in supporting victim-centered and trauma-informed programs, policies, and resources that promote justice, access, and empowerment.

Program Background





Eligibility

State governments



- ✓ Partnerships with non-state entities

Goal

Establish and operate state-run hate crime reporting hotlines to **connect victims to available support services** and **inform them about reporting options** to law enforcement.



Objectives

- Support collaboration with existing national or state-run hotlines for peer-to-peer learning on the successful implementation of state-run hotlines.
- Support collaboration with stakeholders to complete a community resource map to identify the needs of the community and the resources available to address those needs through a hate crime reporting hotline.



Program Requirements

- The hotline will direct victims of hate crimes to available resources
- Ensure caller's personally identifiable information is not directly or indirectly disclosed without the consent of the individual
- Ensure accessibility to hotline to individuals with limited English proficiency, and individuals with disabilities
- Have trained staff members to operate the hotline
- Report to law enforcement, if caller wants – unless required reporting applies

Program Requirements - Language Access

Any institution receiving federal funds must ensure that clients/callers with limited English proficiency or disability have access to language translation and interpretation.



Proposed budget can include translation and interpretation costs, even beyond allowable daily/hourly OJP threshold for consultant services—with prior approval.

Each award up to: \$1,125,000

Period of Performance start date: 10/1/2024

Period of Performance duration: 36 months

Total amount to be awarded under solicitation: \$2,250,000

Helping Crime Survivors Find Their Justice

Applications **MUST** Include

- **Basic minimum requirements** to advance to peer review and receive consideration for funding:
 - SF-424 and SF-LLL (in Grants.gov)
 - **Proposal Abstract**
 - **Proposal Narrative:**
 - a) Statement of the Problem/Description of the Issue (5%)
 - b) Project Design and Implementation (45%)
 - c) Capabilities and Competencies (20%)
 - d) Plan for Collecting the Data for this Solicitation's Performance Measures (10%)
 - **Budget Web-Based Worksheet and Budget Narrative (20%)**

Proposal Abstract

An abstract is a **clear and simple summary** statement about your proposal.

Less than 400 words and should include:

- purpose,
- primary activities,
- expected outcomes,
- the service area, and
- intended subrecipients/partners, if any.

Proposal Narrative: Project Design and Implementation

- Include goals, objectives and activities that are aligned with the solicitation.
- Be brief, concise, and clear.
- Make sure the information is consistent throughout your proposal.
- Describe potential partnerships, if applicable.

Proposal Narrative: Capabilities and Competencies

1. Identify the key individuals and organizations involved in the proposed project.
2. Demonstrate that the individuals and organizations identified have the capacity to address the stated need.
3. Describe specific roles and responsibilities of all project partners and key staff.
4. Demonstrate that the applicant or its partners have expertise to implement the project.
5. Clearly describe who will implement activities.
6. Include descriptions and copies of resumes for proposed key staff positions.

Proposal Narrative: Plan for Collecting Data

- Describe the process for measuring project performance.
- Identify who and how the data will be collected.
- Say how the information will be used to guide and evaluate the project's impact.
- What is the process to accurately report data?



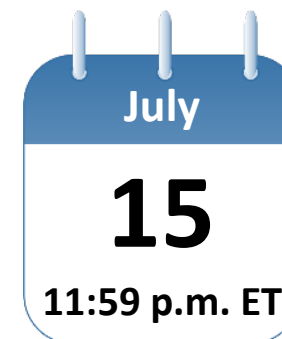
Budget



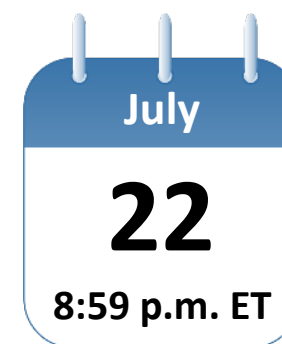
- Use the JustGrants web-based form.
- Include adequate funding to fully implement the project.
- Provide a 3-year budget with a yearly breakdown.
- Ensure the budget is mathematically sound and aligned with the proposed project design.
- Include a narrative for each budget line item.





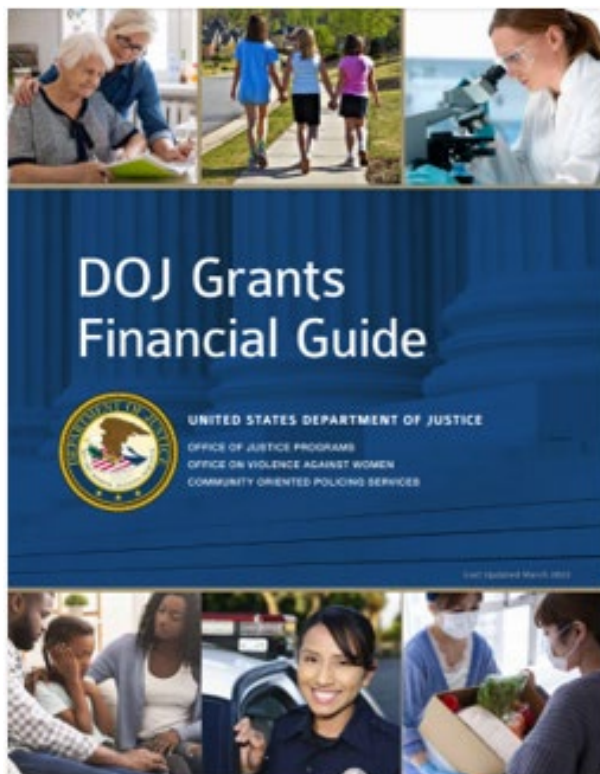
