NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

^{1.} Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

The New Hampshire Victims Compensation Program reports a 67.5% increase in applications compared to Quarter 3 (April 1-June 30, 2020.) This increase is due to significant decrease in applications for Quarter 3, which is a direct result of the COVID pandemic.

2. The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation

Count days from time of receipt of application to decision. 45

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. NH Victims Compensation Program receives applications for crime-related assistance directly from a victim or an advocate or health care professional working with a victim. Applications are processed and opened within 2-3 business days upon receipt. The program staff forwards an acknowledgment letter to the claimant, which contains the claimants claim number and requests supporting documentation, when applicable, and provides the claimant with information concerning debt collection delay for crime-related expenses. Staff requests police reports and completion of a Law Enforcement Authority Verification Form from the law enforcement agency investigating the crime. Upon receipt of the police reports, the claim is marked as commission ready and the program coordinator reviews each claim for eligibility and makes a recommendation in accordance with New Hampshire law and Administrative Rule. The coordinator submits the reviewed claims to the New Hampshire Victims Compensation Commission for review and decision. The Commission meets once a month, in a non-public session and reviews, discusses and votes on each commission ready claim to award, reduce, deny or table. Immediately following the Commission meeting, program staff contact the claimants in writing concerning the Commission's decision. Claims that are awarded are provided with an explanation of benefits form. Claims that are denied, are provided with information on how to appeal the denial.

4. Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

The New Hampshire Victims Compensation Program has encountered no emerging/major issues or notable trends that affects this program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

^{5.} Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

The New Hampshire Victims' Compensation Program has an excellent working relationship with the Victim/Witness Advocate at the N.H. U.S. Attorney's Office. Moreover, we work seamlessly with the local FBI pertaining to victims of federal crimes.

^{6.} Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

During the initial height of the COVID pandemic and after, the process of victim compensation services continued and there were no breaks in service. All staff worked remotely and rotated in the office. Additionally, Commission meetings were held via WebEx and the Commission rendered decisions on claims. Staff opened claims, rendered crime-related payments and responded to all victim inquiries in a timely manner, without a break in service to crime victims.

7. Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

No VOCA Compensation Administrative funds were used during the reporting period.

^{8.} Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

The following statutory changes became law on September 18, 2020: The overall program cap was increased to \$40,000. Eligibility to all compensable expenses was expanded to include: (1) Any person who was a victim of a crime under investigation by the cold case homicide unit regardless of the date of the crime; and, (2) Any child victim of physical or sexual abuse, or any person who was a child when a parent or sibling was a victim of a homicide shall be eligible for victim s compensation regardless of the date of the crime.

Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

Outreach and training is a priority of the New Hampshire Victims Compensation Program, however given the current COVID pandemic, it has been challenging. Continued outreach provides system-coordination with various stakeholders and opens barriers for victims who may have not otherwise applied for services. Over the past reporting period, the coordinator of the New Hampshire Victims Compensation Program has attended various meetings via WebEx and Zoom and provided information on how agencies can work together to provide services to crime victims. Meetings with the Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners Board, the NH Attorney General's Task Force on Child Abuse and Neglect and the State Victims Assistance Statewide Steering Committee to discuss how this program assists victims of crime. The Coordinator is also a member of the Attorney General's Task Force on Child Fatality Review Committee; Domestic Violence Fatality Review Committee and the Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners Board, where she provides insight and information concerning the Victims' Compensation Program. The VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator is also the grant manager for the VOCA Compensation grant so contact and coordination is frequent.

^{10.} Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

The Program's public outreach efforts include dissemination of two informational posters concerning the program. Both posters include a QR code with a direct link to the program s online application. Most recently, this program has developed informational flyers pertaining to crime-related funeral expenses and mental health treatment. These flyers have been shared with crisis centers and system based advocates.

NH RSA 21-M:8-g requires an annual report form the NH Victim Assistance Commission. The report was filed with the NH House Ways and Means Committee, the NH Senate Ways and Means Committee, the NH House Criminal Justice and Public Safety Committee and the NH Senate Judiciary Committee on August 7, 2020. ^{12.} Please provide any additional comments that are helpful to improving the Victim Compensation state and/or federal program.

The New Hampshire Victims' Compensation Program strives to improve victim services. It is our desire to add additional benefits (such as childcare for victims going to court) however; we do not have the funding to meet this need. The Program increased some inner monetary caps and the overall program cap from \$30,000 to \$40,000. These financial increases prevent the program from adding additional services without additional funding. It is the hope that Congress and OVC will reevaluate reimbursement rates to compensation programs and increase VOCA funds for compensation programs by changing the statutory allocation formula, as proposed by NACVCB.
