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NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

1. Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

When the Coronavirus pandemic first hit Utah in March 2020, the state directed all people to voluntarily stay home as much as possible and to limit all non-essential activities. Orders were later issued by the state to restrict dine-in services in restaurants, public school attendance, and large gatherings of people. In response, people stayed at home, no longer going to work, driving their cars, or going to public places. People stayed in isolation, no longer attending public events. Fewer people in public resulted in less crime during last quarter reporting time frame. As the state of Utah began to lift restrictions and loosen the pandemic guidelines throughout the summer months and into fall, people stopped telecommuting and returned to work, schools began to reopen and people attended larger public events and social gatherings. Restaurants and bars were now open for dine-in services. The increasing number of people frequenting businesses and attending public gatherings in the communities created more situations and opportunities for potential crime incidents. This potential rise in crime may have resulted in an increase in number of claims for reparations that may have been filed with UOVC in this reporting period.

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Once an application received it is entered into UOVC's database and is assigned to the next Reparations Officer next in line. Letters are automatic generated, one to the victim acknowledging the receipt of the application and a second letter to the Law Enforcement agency requesting a copy of the police report. Once the police report is obtained and other information if needed, the Reparation Officer renders a decision. Once a decision is rendered a letter either an approval or denial goes out to the victim. If it is a denial letter it will state the reason for the denial. If it is an approval letter, it will contain the services approved, therapy, medical etc. Also the approval letter will have attached all necessary forms needed for services, treatment plan, mileage or travel forms etc.

Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

In only a few months, the Coronavirus pandemic changed the way UOVC operates. We had to adapt our office functions quickly to stay operational and to meet victims' needs by providing vital victim services amid a globe pandemic. We implemented organizational changes by shifting to an almost full scale telework plan. All UOVC employees who had the ability to work remotely were encouraged to do so and were provided with assistance from the State's IT department to more smoothly transition to a remote work environment. Whenever possible, staff attended meetings, trainings, and webinars virtually, utilizing on line conferencing and communications, altering the need to travel to events or trainings. The office was closed to outside visitors. The combined efforts of these organizational changes stemmed the tide of the virus with the purpose of keeping employees and people as safe as possible. It is difficult while the pandemic is ongoing to predict how UOVC's employees and the office will operate in the future when the pandemic is over. We may keep some of the implemented changes. One thing for certain is we will continue to provide the highest level of service in the safest environment possible to victims and victim services in the state of Utah.

UOVC continues to have a strong alliance and collaborative relationship with the State's Tribal and Federal entities.

UOVC continues to apply SUCCESS processes which has continually increased process speeds while at the same time increase the levels of customer services to victims.

The VOCA Administrative funds continue to be a valuable resource to the State of Utah in helping to meet the needs of victims of violent crime statewide. Administrative funds are used to hire additional temporary staff to help with workloads to assist victims in a timely matter. Because of these funds we are able to keep the additional rental space for our training resource center. We use these funds to help continue with updates to our technology to be able to hold trainings statewide webinars for all the different agencies who asset victims statewide.

Our office also administers the VOCA Assistance, VAWA Assistance and SASP Assistance grants for our State. Our compensation processing staff meet and train alongside our victim assistance staff as well as victim advocates and service providers from around the State. They are also involved in needs assessment and other planning meetings with stake holders statewide. Our office coordinates the Utah Council on Victims of Crime, a statutory body with the responsibility of driving policy and law that effect victims. Our office initiated extensive outreach to Native American communities. Multiple compensation and assistance staff members are sitting member on the Utah Tribal and Native American Issues Committee and with our Director attends all Utah Tribal Leaders' meeting to be accountable to and report to Tribal leaders any success, solutions and ongoing issues regarding victimization in Tribal ares.

UOVC utilizes staff members, our office Victim Advocates, Reparations Program Manager and the Director to conduct public outreach and training services for the Compensation program Hospitals, schools, tribal leaders, police agencies and police academy, non profit agencies just to list a few.
