1. Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

There has not been a significant change in the number of applications.

2. The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation

Count days from time of receipt of application to decision. 687

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. The application review process had a major revision during this fiscal year. At the beginning of the year, claims over the requested amount of \$2,000 were reviewed, processed by Specialist and submitted to the Commissioners to make the claims decisions. Commissioners would meet at the agency once a month and their claims decisions were recorded. In an effort to make the agency more efficient and process claims quicker, changes were made to the process to allow the director to make decisions daily instead of monthly. The current process is a follows: applications are assigned a claim number when submitted to the agency. They are entered into the claims management system, and assigned to a claims specialists. The Specialist collects all supporting documentation needed to process a claim, and write a summary. The Specialists makes a recommendation regarding the claims decision. Those summaries are sent through team review, where they are reviewed by the claims manager, attorney and executive director. Once reviewed by the director, claims are return to the Specialists to make any needed corrections. After corrections are made, the claim returns to the director for approval of the Specialist's claims decision recommendation. With the changes in the process, the director can make the final claims decisions and sign off on each claim. After a claims decision is made, claims will move to the expense team and all reimbursements are calculated and processed.

3. Does your state have a victim satisfaction survey?

Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

The largest impact to the agency in the past year has been the decrease in state revenue. Due to this decrease, the agency has not been able to fill vacant positions and staff are performing duties of multiple positions. Without adequate staffing, claims production will suffer and cause a greater backlog.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

The agency has a good working relationship with victim service specialist from the U.S. Attorneys' Offices and FBI Offices in the state. At times, state and federal offices will coordinate efforts to assist victims. Victims of federal crimes also file claims independent of federal agency involvement.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

Changes were made to the claims processing procedures to decrease the amount of time it takes to process a claim. Instead of the Commissioners conducting a monthly review and making decisions, the director can make decisions regarding claim status on a daily basis. The agency is still going through the transition of new processes, with the anticipation that it will shorten processing times.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

This agency did not use any VOCA funds for administrative expenses.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

On April 1, 2022, a new law was passed to allow crime victims compensation the ability to make changes to the compensation process with the goal of making claims processing more efficient. This law allows the executive director to make decisions on a daily basis, instead of Commissioners making decisions monthly. A second law involving compensation was passed that would require law enforcement agencies that collected revenue from tickets, to give all ticket fees in excess of 15% of their budget to crime victims compensation. At present, no money has been received as a result of this law.

Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

Staff of this agency work daily with victim service officers from District Attorney's Offices around the state to assist victims with the completion and submission of their application. Trainings are conducted with law enforcement each quarter to make sure they are aware of their state required obligation to provide victims of crime information about their rights and the availability of crime victims compensation. We work with victim specialists with the U.S. Attorneys' Office and the FBI, to answer questions or address the needs of the victims they serve.

10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

The agency has an outreach program that allows staff to travel or attend meetings remotely to conduct compensation trainings to law enforcement, victim service agencies, community groups, and hospital staff. There were approximately 19 trainings during this past year.

The agency submits quarterly reports to the State of Alabama regarding the total number of claims approved for compensation (1,118), the number of law enforcement or service providers who receive training regarding compensation (359), and to increase the average number of claims processed by each Specialist to a target average of 21 (currently averaging 19 per month each).
