1. Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Upon receipt all applications are reviewed. If verified as complete, the application is then assigned to a caseworker and is entered into the MO CVC system, and a system-generated claim number is assigned. If any additional information is required from the victim/claimant, the assigned caseworker reaches out to the victim/ in writing to request the additional information. In the eligibility determination process the caseworker completes a series of tasks to collect information that may include: Requesting reports from a law enforcement, if not included with the application Requests a completed MO CVC Law Enforcement Verification form Conducts a Medicaid verification Contacts the prosecutor if an alleged offender is known, and requests a completed MO CVC Prosecutor Input form Contacts service providers to verify actual out of pocket crime related expenses (medical, funeral, counseling, loss of income/loss of support, etc.) Upon receipt and verification of all required information a recommendation is made by the caseworker to approve, partially approve or deny the claim. The recommendation is then reviewed by a supervisor who renders the final eligibility determination.

Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

The program continues to experience effects of the Covid 19 pandemic. Missouri is ever so slightly beginning to see an increase in the level of fee and fines; however those levels are not anywhere near pre-pandemic levels.. Additionally, we are starting to see an uptick in the number of applications that may have been delayed due to pandemic periods of isolation and access to assistance and/or medical attention.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

For this reporting period, there were no federal crime applications received.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

During the reporting period, a continuous effort to address the language used in correspondence with victims/claimants resulted in several standard document improvements.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

During this reporting period, VOCA administrative funds were not utilized.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

Rule 11 CSR 30-18.010 was Effective Oct. 30, 2021, Eligible victim/claimants can now seek reimbursed for: Lost wages to attend or participate in court proceedings, temporary lodging if there is the presence of fear or apprehension in returning to the victim/claimant place of residence and such fear or apprehension is related to a compensable crime Reimbursement may only be made for actual expenses for up to fourteen days of temporary lodging and is limited to the MO CONUS rate for lodging Replacement for clothing and bedding held as evidence, Replacement or repair of locks at the victim's residence or other involved residence, Dependent care to allow victims to participate in criminal justice activates or secure medical treatment and rehabilitation service, when such care would not have been incurred but for the compensable crime and must be a licensed or registered with Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services. The new rules provide MO CVC the authority to consider reimbursement for additional, out of pocket crime related expenses

9. Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

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MO CVC has collaborative relationships with key stakeholders within the Missouri victim services network. Our partners include: The Missouri Office of Prosecuting Attorneys; this agency houses a Statewide Victim Advocate that coordinates all prosecutorial based advocates. In addition, this office also houses a victim advocate coordinator who focuses coordination efforts on VOCA Assistance funded advocates. The Office of State Courts Administrator as well as individual circuits The MO Department of Public Safety s Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) office The Missouri State Highway Patrol, The Missouri Sheriff s Association, the Missouri Police Chiefs Association, the Missouri Attorney General s Office as well as local law enforcement domestic violence/sexual assault teams, law enforcement based advocates, records management/custodian personnel, and chief executives of local law enforcement agencies Community-based advocates statewide; many of which are funding by federal programs such as VOCA, VAWA, SASP as well as a variety of State funding such as Missouri s State Services to Victim Fund Other partner agencies include the MO Dept. of Corrections, Missouri Probation and Parole Board, MO. Dept. of Mental Health, Missouri Department of Social Services and the MO Dept. of Health and Senior Services and statewide Missouri Coalition Against Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence

10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

During this reporting period the MO CVC program has conducted 12 presentations with approximately 348 attendees. The presentation are tailored to fit the needs of the audience (law enforcement, medical/counseling providers, funeral providers, advocates, and social service workers)
