During this reporting period, there was a small increase (292 applications) to the number of applications received compared to the previous reporting period.

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. 1) New applications are received and entered into a database by a Claims Processor. 2) New workloads are evaluated for eligibility by the Claims Examiner and missing documentation is requested. 3) Claims Examiners submit reviewed claims with Decision recommendations to the Claims Supervisor. 4) The Claims Supervisor reviews all claims for accuracy and submits eligible claims to the compensation recovery department and all other claims to the DCVC staffing team.

Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

DCVC continues to monitor the health of the Crime Victims Fund and its possible impact on VOCA. It's decline has not impacted the program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims yet however, DCVC is diligent in discussing efforts to coordinate a potential response should the fund continue to decrease.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

DCVC maintains a good working relationship with law enforcement victim advocates, both state and federal, who are aware of the services DCVC provides to victims of crime. In addition, DCVC has a mass casualty response team, who can deploy upon request by any of these victim advocates.

Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

DCVC reevaluated the staffing process for denied claims and made some adjustments. The new process has only been in place for a little over 6 months.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

VOCA Administrative funds were used for one person to attend the National Association of Crime Victim Compensation Boards conference in Alexandria, VA. Due to pandemic restrictions participation was limited from each state. The information from the conference and the networking with other compensation managers across the nation was invaluable. The information helped to evaluate current processes and determine best practices to serve crime victims.

Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

There were no significant changes to statute or policy. As pandemic restrictions lifted, DCVC took the initiative to conduct more in-person training and attend more conference in-person to increase exposure of DCVC's services to crime victims.

9. Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

As pandemic restrictions lifted during this reporting period, DCVC resumed conducting training to law enforcement, prosecutors and non-governmental agencies in-person. These trainings afforded the opportunity for attendees to address issues/concerns as it related to their respective geographic areas or demographic population. If there are barriers to service victim advocates can address it at training, they can send individual emails to staff or the deputy director or they can submit questions through the DCVC website.

10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

DCVC participated in statewide conferences and community events during the reporting period. DCVC staff provided training and participated as attendees in the SC Victims' Rights Week conference which had over 400 people attend (in-person and virtually). DCVC participated, hosted an exhibit table and provided information about its services at the SC Law Enforcement Victim Advocate conference which hosted over 180 people. DCVC participated in community events such as the domestic violence awareness event hosted by the Laurens Police Department and the community information event facilitated by the Latimer Manor community in Columbia, SC.
