1. Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

Wyoming has not seen any significant flux in our compensation numbers.

2. The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Wyoming's procedure for processing CVC claims begins when our office receives the (paper) application. The application is date stamped and the received date is entered into the CCVC database utilized by our state. The date the claim is received is referred to as the "new date." The claim is then presented to the Claims Analyst who will review the claim for completeness and, if the claim is complete and able to be processed, the Analyst will make a decision on the eligibility of the claim. The date that eligibility is determined is referred to as the "resolution date" and a corresponding "resolution code" is entered to reflect the status of the claim (ie: Approved; Denied; or Unable to Process). If a claim is "unable to process" the claim will undergo follow up to see if there is missing information that must be obtained before the claim can be resolved as approved or denied. The Resolution Date of a claim previously identified as "unable to process" will be changed to reflect the date the claim was finally resolved as "approved" or "denied." The calculation of "processing time" measures the time between when the claim is received (New Date) and when a decision has been made on the claim (Resolution Date). The actual calculation for this reporting period was 11.55 days; up from last year's average of 7.62 days. Anecdotally, we believe this change was due to a large amount in staff turnover in our state's largest county's (Laramie County) which is struggling with a much maligned and beleaguered District Attorney's Office. We believe this has affected the quality and completeness of the applications we receive. The required follow up from our office in order to obtain a completed application for review has caused a significant delay.

Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

Our state continues to see lingering affects from COVID-19 pandemic. Victim service programs across the state report issues with staff retention and hiring. By having fewer advocates in the field, we feel the number of applications to CVC is impacted. Additionally, the District Attorney in our states largest city, Cheyenne, WY,(Laramie County) has seen significate complaints and pending disciplinary action by the state bar & Supreme Court related to their office's functioning (or lack there of) and complaints from victims. This troubling development leads our office to believe that victims in Laramie County are not being served properly. With the recent election of a new District Attorney, we hope to see improved services to victims and this may impact our offices numbers in a positive way.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

Wyoming CVC routinely works with our US Attorney's Office Victim Assistance Coordinator as well as our state's FBI, and Department of Homeland Security. Wyoming has F.E. Warren Air Force Base, a large land mass Indian Reservation in our state, and a vast area of federal lands. Because of these federal areas, compensation routinely receives claims from tribal members and victims of crimes that fall under federal jurisdiction. All of our programs (across the state) are well versed in assisting victims for both state and federal crimes.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

There were no significant changes to how Wyoming CVC operates. Wyoming CVC continues to conduct new employee training on compensation for all victim service providers in the state. We hope the election of a new DA in Laramie County, there will be an improvement in service to victims in our state's largest city.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

Administrative funds are used to support travel costs for our Compensation Analyst to conduct compensation training for programs upon request. Additionally, Wyoming uses administrative funds to ensure both the SAA (Division Director) and the Compensation Analyst attend national and regional compensation training conducted by NACVCB, OVC, or other federal agencies. Finally, administrative funds are used to support the ongoing maintenance for our Compensation Claims Database administered by Genoa Group.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

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In the most recent legislative session our office worked with the Wyoming Coalition Against Domestic Violence & Sexual Assault to enhance our state's stalking definition to cover more victims. The enhanced definition covers the use of electronic tracking devices and other digital and tech related mechanisms to harass victims. By widening the definition we may be able to capture more victims under the umbrella of compensation eligible crimes.

9. Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

Historically, our office conducts a Mandatory Meeting for all of our sub-recipient programs on an annual basis. However, this year that meeting was not held due the lack of interest in meeting in person due to a surge in COVID cases (at that time - May 2022). Typically, at this meeting, programs are apprised of any innovations in victim services, or changes within our office that would affect service delivery to victims. As a component of that meeting, programs are given compensation training and guidance on eligibility and the compensation application process. Instead, we have relied on programs to identify new staff who need the required Compensation Training to fulfill their obligation under our grant award as a condition to receiving VOCA-Assistance funding. Additionally, with the use of VOCA-Assistance administrative funds, our office holds an annual conference (Joint Symposium on Children and Youth- WyJSCY) where all allied professionals are given extensive training on best practices for victims. This year the WyJSCY able to hold an in-person training, the first since June 2019. Again, as part of the curriculum at the conference, there is an emphasis upon and updates to crime victims compensation. Finally, every Peace Office Basic candidate in our state receives victim's compensation training delivered to them as part of their core curriculum at the Wyoming Law Enforcement Academy. The Academy training is now given by one of our office's Regional Program Managers who oversees VOCA -Assistance funding and monitors a 1/3 of our statewide programs.

10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

As described above, we rely on our sub-recipients, whom we train, to conduct public outreach to victims on the availability of crime victims compensation. I believe we do a very good job of making sure victims understand the availability of crime victims compensation. By making sure all advocates, law enforcement and other allied professionals are both aware of and trained upon the crime victims compensation program, Wyoming makes great strides in improving public awareness of the program. The Division also has a Facebook page and Website hosted by the State of Wyoming where information and FAQs on Crime Victim Compensation are readily available. Additionally, the Division's receives a fair amount of press due to the activities of both the AG's Human Trafficking's Task Force & the Governor's Missing & Murdered Indigenous Persons Task Force, which is administered by the Division Director. Each time these task forces are featured the compensation program is highlighted.

PMT is the primary data source for outcome measure specifically on compensation. However, the Division of Victim Services does use the data we collect from all of our programs via all of our federal grants to compile a "state of the state" each year for our Governor. We track where (by county and program) our compensation applications come from, and thus can measure which programs are serving what victims. If we see particular counties or programs that don't seem to be submitting compensation applications, we target our training and technical assistance toward addressing any barriers that victims or the programs may be facing in filing for compensation.

Please provide any additional comments that are helpful to improving the Victim Compensation state and/or federal program.

During this reporting period our office created the first ever (for our state) Restitution Recovery Program. This position's primary responsibility will be to enforce our state's restitution collection statutes and improve restitution orders to be paid back into the crime victim's fund when CVC has paid our on a claim. Additionally, the Restitution Program will assist all victims in receiving what is owed to them by providing training and technical assistance to the 23 clerks of court in our state. Plans for training county prosecutors and judges are in the works for the next reporting period. This position was filled in October 2022 and will be reflected in next years annual report.
