 During this reporting period in 2022, we had 132 claims, 49 of those approved for payment. In this same reporting period in 2023, we had 160 claims with 26 of those being eligible. We have increased the number of applications every reporting period this year as well as getting more applications from counties we didn't have any from.
2. **The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation**
 Count days from time of receipt of application to decision. 42

 Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. We receive the application, and it is date stamped and assigned a claims investigator. Then it is entered into the system, an acknowledgement letter is sent out, and the application is then scanned and filed. The claims investigators go in order of applications received, and they create a finding of fact page. This determines eligibility and gives the claimant 30 days to respond whether they agree or disagree. After the 30 day period, our commissioner's sign an order that is then sent to the claimant. If payment is recommended, it gets forwarded on to our financial office to process.

We also set up a table at various information fairs around the state. Several of our employees do victim centered conferences in order to serve them in the best way.
